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Blue Ridge National Heritage Area Avery County Narrative Summary

Avery County is the 100th and last county formed in North Carolina in 1911, from portions of Mitchell, Watauga and Caldwell Counties. Avery County is located in the northwest mountain in the region known as the "High County." Our rural county is composed of several small communities of less than 1,000 year-round residents. The population in 2002 was 17,526. Approximately half of the county lies within the Pisgah National Forest. It is home to famous mountain peaks like Grandfather Mountain, Beech and Sugar. Avery County has the highest county seat east of the Mississippi River, Newland at 3,621 feet, and Beech Mountain is the highest incorporated town in Eastern America with an elevation of 5,506 feet.

Tourism is the leading industry in Avery County, bringing in about \$51 million each year, due to the natural landmarks, scenic wonders and year round outdoor activities. It is one of the most desirable tourist destinations in the Southeastern United States. Natural landmarks such as Wiseman's View which provides an awesome view of Linville Gorge, water falls, wild trout streams, major golf resorts, and the Blue Ridge Parkway make Avery County an extremely desirable destination. The winter season brings visitors to ski on two slopes located in Avery County, and a major summer activity is the Grandfather Highland Games held at Linville Meadows.

Avery County is known as the "Christmas Tree Capital of the World". Growing Christmas trees and ornamental shrubbery is the second leading industry in Avery County, generating \$30 million in sales each year and increasing year by year. Over 900 families are active in the business.

Avery County has a strong tradition in arts and crafts ranging from pottery, quilts and other woven works, furniture, art toys, jewelry, photography, and the fine arts. Mountain handicrafts are prized possessions because of fine workmanship and creative design. Area artists and craftsmen show their work in open studios, shops and local craft festivals.

During the spring of 2005 representatives from Avery County began the process of identifying projects that conserve and celebrate the natural, cultural, historic, recreational and agricultural resources of the county. The process to identify the county's assets and the proposed initiatives for future heritage tourism development was culminated at a public meeting in April. From the meetings came the formation of the Avery County Heritage Alliance whose mission is to strengthen relationships between government, private, educational and non-profit organizations across the county and unite the communities in the preservation of the county's culture, history and natural assets to leave a legacy of our past to the future generations of Avery County. The Avery County Museum will be the hub of this networking alliance.

The Avery County Heritage Alliance will be made up of community leaders/historians, the Greater Banner Elk Heritage Foundation, Lees-McRae Historical Society, and the Avery County Museum. Leaders from each group will serve on the board that will design a project that will link every community to the museum hub. The priorities include historical markers for communities, a county cultural quest project, and development of historical and connecting trails. The Alliance will help launch a capital campaign to restore, enhance and preserve the Avery County Museum.

The Avery County Blue Ridge Heritage Development Plan is an integrated approach to developing historic, natural/recreational, infrastructure, music, craft/arts, and agriculture. The Plan identifies specific projects that improve natural greenways and trails, the restoration and preservation of historical buildings and homes, support of infrastructure projects, coordination of agritourism events, and arts/craft and music initiatives.

OVERARCHING OBJECTIVE

The overarching objective of the Avery County Heritage Plan is to improve the quality of life for residents of the several communities in the county by preserving the history, culture and natural resources that make this county a special place to live, while enhancing the economic development of the area through the thoughtful development of heritage tourism.

Initiative Title:

Avery County Historical Museum

Project Narrative:

The Avery County Historical Museum is housed in the old Avery County Jail, built in 1912 and set aside as a museum by the County Commissioners in 1976. The Museum was founded by the Avery County Bicentennial Committee and opened in October 1976. The Museum is listed on the Register of Historical Places. The purpose if the Museum is to collect, preserve, educate and display all vital information, photographs and artifact about people, events, and places that make up the history of Avery County and the surrounding areas. An important part of the Museum is the genealogy section which contains an extensive selection of books, papers and family histories to aid in researching family genealogies. The following initiatives will aid the Museum to become the hub of the Avery County Heritage Alliance.

PAID STAFF: A person to seek and write grants, fund-raising, membership campaigns, media relations, management, work with teachers, and produce a newsletter. The staff person will also assist with the Avery County Heritage Alliance initiatives. **BUILDING:** The Museum has only had minor upkeep since opened in 1976. The

BUILDING: The Museum has only had minor upkeep since opened in 19/6. The building needs extensive repairs due to termite and water damage. A new roof is a must if the building is to be preserved. Also a fire alarm/security system and additional storage is needed so we can continue to accept artifacts and materials for further displays and store items used in rotating displays.

Initiative Title: Heritage Park Conference Center

Project Narrative:

The Heritage Park Conference Center located on Heritage Park recreational grounds, within the town of Newland, will provide facilities for the celebration of Avery County's natural and social resources. The Center will consist of two levels, a large exhibition area, a large performance stage and seating area, break-out rooms with soundproof slide dividers, large windows with panoramic views, a deck, a commercial kitchen, a lobby and restrooms. The Center will provide space for blue grass and mountain music festivals, story telling festivals, country dances, Christmas tree and ornamental shrub exhibitions, arts and crafts shows, cooking and canning classes, lecture series, historical exhibits, dramatic productions and numerous other events that will attract local residents, as well as travelers and tourists. The Center will serve as a countywide facility for celebrating and sharing the historical benefits of life in the Blue Ridge Mountains. It will be a source of pride, an instrument of economic development, but more importantly, it will serve as a primary vehicle to unify and solidify the bonds within a fragmented county. The recognition of a common heritage, and the love of that heritage, will move the county into a new era of appreciation and pride.

Sloop Dam on the Linville River, A Conservation and Recreational Park, with an educational component in the powerhouse explaining early hydro-electricity and telling the story of Dr. E.H. Sloop, honoring his resourcefulness and ingenuity as part of our area's heritage.

Project Narrative:

The Historic Sloop Dam is a massive wall of river rock arching across the Linville River. Once 25' high and 225 wide, it was breeched in the middle by the hurricanes of 2004, leaving an awe-inspiring waterfall 15' high, creating a more environmentally healthy water flow.

Beside the dam is a powerhouse, also constructed in the unique rock style found in the historic buildings in the town of Crossnore. Both facts and myths abound about Dr. Sloop's generator and how he provided electricity to his hospital and the town. The story of the dam is told in the book, *Miracle in the Hills* that documents the work of Drs. Eustace H. Sloop and Mary Martin Sloop published in 1953 by McGraw-Hill. The Sloops have left a legacy of healthcare, education and childcare- a proud heritage for the town of Crossnore.

The Sloop family owns over 300 acres along one side of the Linville River. The Forestry Service has more acreage than that on the other side. And 600+ acres upstream, the owner is considering putting his land into a conservation trust. All this land on the river creates a valuable wildlife area.

Brothers Chuck and Bill Sloop, grandsons of the Drs. Sloop, are the sole heirs to the dam and property. They are thinking of giving their inheritance to an agency that can

- o Conserve the natural environment of the area allowing trails for walking and fishing.
- O Historically preserve the powerhouse complete with an educational component for teaching about early hydro-electricity and telling the story of Dr. E.H. Sloop's endeavors as well as listing the community members who built the dam. There is an elementary school and children's home in Crossnore where our heritage and a respect for the culture at that time could be valuable lessons.
- The dam may need to be worked on to insure safety to visitors and to keep the Linville a healthy river. The Sloop family and the community would like the character of the dam to remain intact and leave the fall of water at it greatest. Gathering inspiration from the power of falling water should be part of the experience.

Crossnore Community Enhancement Inc., a recently acknowledged 501 (c) (3) corporation has been trying to find an agency willing to take this

worthwhile but conditional gift from Chuck and Bill Sloop.

The High Country Conservancy serving Watauga, Ashe and Avery counties has presented CCE and the Sloops with information about grants from **The NC Parks and Recreation Trust Fund. PARTF** gives matching grants up to \$500,000. The Sloop's land would provide the match and \$500,000 could be put into 1) the powerhouse, 2) dam renovations, and 3) the trail system. The primary issue is to find a governmental agency or partnerships able to assume recreational liability and continued upkeep.

We would like Avery County to recognize the benefit of providing a park like this to the people of our county as well as our visiting tourists. The Linville River is an asset that citizens have difficulty accessing. The dam, on the other hand, has easy access and could have a flat trail for a pleasurable walk, for exercise or for fishing. The inspiration and/or education derived from going to the dam seems to be a perfect project for the **Blue Ridge National Heritage Area.**

Title:	

Project Narrative:

The Crossnore Weavers and Gallery: A Working Museum, shares its history from 1929 with that of The Crossnore School, a children's home with a 93-year history. The Crossnore School's founder, Mary Martin Sloop, began the weaving program at The Crossnore School for three reasons: first, to revive and preserve the art of traditional Appalachian weaving; second, to provide an economic opportunity to women of the area; and third, to promote and market The Crossnore School and its mission to children through the sale of woven goods to DAR and other contacts. As a working museum, the Weaving Room now features an open studio where visitors can see woven articles being produced and talk with the weavers as they work. Currently, the studio/museum space houses 12 looms with goods in production. The "expanded" museum will utilize the existing artifacts and photographs (in addition to others to be provided by the community at large) to present a coherent picture of the Weaving Room's history as well as a loving tribute to the women who wove it.
